#### **David Cheshire**

Here are some notes made in relation to David's presentation at the Society in February. We hope that you may find them useful. I recently asked David how Chelsea had gone for him this year after last year's success. He told me that unfortunately he had had to pull out of the show due to a problem with nematodes in imported trees. He has had to liquidate several specimens as a result. Like Arnie, however, he says he "will be back"!

#### Japan

- ✓ Bonsai is becoming a dying art in Japan itself. There has been a decline in the quality and quantity of trees.
- ✓ Some species are banned for import due to pests and diseases. Bonsai is only allowed to be imported if grown in proper medium, in pot, in quarantine.
- ✓ Potters are ageing and pop are getting smaller.
- ✓ Shinji Suzuki Nursery and Taikan Bonsai Museum in the north of Japan worth a look if you're travelling!

#### Trees

- $\checkmark$  Trees should be grown naturally and shaped by nature.
- $\checkmark$  Wind can dry out trees more quickly.
- ✓ When it is hot, increase the humidity around the tree. Do not increase the amount of water to the roots.
- ✓ Naturally use light and movement with repositioning of trees in pots. You don't need to use wire.
- ✓ If you do use wire, hook around the pot as this reduces damage to the branches themselves.
- ✓ Trees will live longer if they are slow grown, naturally within their own environment. Fast growing produces less dense wood and will die younger. Control the water...
- ✓ Choose pots that are rough inside for roots to have something to hold on to. Also be aware of drainage holes. Keep cuttings humid - surround them with polythene. They need humidity, controlled environments and temperatures.
- ✓ Dormant trees still produce roots...

# GARDENING TIPS OF THE MONTH.

Don't set out your outdoor tomatoes until all risk of frost has passed. The current cool northerly/easterly winds are a good substitute for frost if you ask me. When you eventually get them in to the ground set them a little lower than they have been growing in the pots in the greenhouse. More beneficial roots will then be produced. Whatever you do don't cut back the leaves of your daffodils or even tie them up in to a "tidy" knot. Just leave them to die back naturally. You can give the bulbs a good feed if you wish.

Net fruit bushes and strawberry plants when the fruit starts to develop.

"No mow May" has meant that we have just cut the grass in the garden for the first time. This has allowed grasses and flowers to develop and hopefully set some seed. You could leave patches unmown if you wish.

### MALCOLM HUGHES.

Malcolm Hughes's recent visit to Redditch was of much interest to all who were in attendance. He spoke firstly about trees which were perhaps more suitable for use as bonsai and then moved on to talk about developments in judging. Here are the notes that he provided following the meeting. Again we hope that you find them useful.

	Distribution:	Positioning of branches
BRANCHES	Ramification:	Extent of fine branch development
	Bark:	Quality of wiring (if present) and lack of wire marks
	Jins/ sharis:	As appropriate to the tree – give aged appearance
	Leaves:	Horticultural perfection
FOLIAGE	Blemishes:	Evidence of disease, windburn etc.
	Size:	In proportion to the tree
SOIL / SURFACE	Well finished:	Clear of weeds:
DRESSING	Surface:	Appropriate surface cover e.g. moss or fine akadama
	Trunk:	Appropriate taper
TRUNK,	Root base:	Well or badly distributed as surface roots (nebari)
<b>ROOTS &amp; NEBARI</b>	If a Rock planting:	Roots give natural impression of having grown
