### **COMING UP AT THE MBS.**

The MBS meeting on 5<sup>th</sup> February also features a Re-potting and Root pruning workshop. Let’s hope that this meeting and the Redditch meeting are not affected by the weather as the MBS January event was. We hope that you will all agree that the decision to cancel that meeting was the right one in the circumstances!

### **BONSAI TIP OF THE MONTH.**

It’s time to think about re-potting, hence the choice of subject for this month’s meeting. Whilst we are not ones to keep detailed records of the progress/development of our trees we do at least keep a record of what has and what hasn’t been re-potted each year. Without this record we would be all at sea trying to remember what was and what wasn’t re-potted. We are not going to tell you how often to re-pot your trees. There is no hard and fast rule. Generally younger trees require re-potting more often than older specimens, perhaps every year. Trees that have become “pot bound” should also be attended to at this time. Faster growing varieties such as trident maple, hornbeam and

cotoneaster will require attention more frequently than pines and junipers for example. Specimens of the latter may not require attention for up to five or six years. All re-potted trees should be sheltered from the worst of the weather for a couple of weeks.

### **GARDENING TIP OF THE MONTH.**

Keep lawns free of fallen leaves. There's still time to plant bare root roses, shrubs and hedging. Take root cuttings of verbascum and oriental poppies and hardwood cuttings of viburnum. Winter prune apples and pears trying to keep an open aspect in the canopy – Angela's uncle used to say that you should be able to throw your hat up /through a large tree! Towards the end of February you could think about cutting back autumn raspberries – take them down to about 6/8 inches. If frost threatens however, we advise waiting a while.

If it's raining then take the time to sort out your seeds for 2026 and make a plan/timetable for planting during the year. Have a look at Chiltern Seeds for some new ideas. They have a very extensive catalogue.
